Allentown Boys and Girls Club, Inc. - Fort Washington Branch	\$7,500	Allentown Boys and Girls Club, Inc. - Fort Washington Branch will use grant funds for expenses related to developmental activities designed to prepare them for life's challenges.
Alliance for Innovation in Education, Inc.	\$20,000	Alliance for Innovation in Education will use grant funds for expenses related to the implementation and execution of a technology training program for high school youth in Prince George's County. More specifically, funds will help pay for the cost of an IT instructor and student assistants, space for conducting the program, providing snacks and refreshments for participating youth, purchasing used laptops for students who successfully complete the program, administrative and operational expenses, and for a \$1,000 scholarship to an eligible Prince George's County high school football player.
Anacostia Watershed Society, Inc.	\$20,000	Anacostia Watershed Society will use grant funds for expenses related to helping restore natural habitat and improve public parklands; engaging youth and their families in safe recreation; educating students and adults about watershed protection; and reducing pollution in the Anacostia River and its tributaries.
ARC of Prince George's County, Inc.	\$30,000	ARC of Prince George's County will use grant funds for expenses related to supporting all program activities carried out by The ARC that serve to increase community inclusion for individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities. More specifically, funds will be used to conduct program elements that are not covered by the Developmental Disabilities Administration (DDA), including the cost of community activities in arts and recreation; transportation; hiring a new job developer; expanding workshops, internships and job training for transitioning youth; and working to add a new Project SEARCH site in the northern part of the county within the next 18 months.
Atlantic Seaboard Dyslexia Education Center	\$30,000	Atlantic Seaboard Dyslexia Education Center [ASDEC] will use grant funds for expenses related to training kindergarten and first grade teachers in four pilot schools to screen and identify struggling readers and deliver highly effective multisensory instruction interventions designed to prevent reading failure. In addition, former PGCPs teacher will train up to 60 middle and high school teachers in proven multisensory methods to improve comprehension through vocabulary and writing.
Autism FYI Organization Corporation	\$15,000	Autism FYI will use grant funds for expenses related to continuing training of first responders, the community and businesses, and improve online and in-person training programs for first responder entities. Funds will also be used to support the Immediate Recognition Increases Safety (IRIS) safety training program, its 24-hour hotline, and free emergency phone app. IRIS provides a means for those with disabilities to visually self-disclose their need for special considerations and have their emergency contacts and information available to first responders through the 24-hour hotline.
Beltsville Seventh Day Adventist Church - Beltsville Adventist Community Center (BACC)	\$50,000	Beltsville Seventh Day Adventist Church - Beltsville Adventist Community Center (BACC) will use grant funds for expenses related to providing emergency rent, utilities, temporary housing, sliding scale counseling, transportation services, assistance and support to public elementary high school students in need through partnership with school staffs, assistance to refugees, and food to individuals and families in need.

Bowie State University Foundation	\$40,000	Bowie State University Foundation will use grant funds for expenses related to providing scholarship funds to eligible Prince George's County high school graduates to cover tuition and fees for new first-time and returning students.
CALMRA, Inc. - Christian Assisted Living for Mentally Retarded Adults	\$20,000	CALMRA, Inc. will use grant funds for expenses related to renovations to new space in the Mary Solko Senior Center, including bathroom accessibility and a commercial kitchen.
Capital Area Food Bank- Senior Nutrition Supplemental Funding	\$50,000	Capital Area Food Bank will use grant funds for expenses related to staff salaries, benefits, food procurement costs and food delivery for the Senior Brown Bag Program in Prince George's County.
CASA De Maryland	\$150,000	CASA de Maryland will use grant funds for expenses related to conducting its holistic workforce development and immigrant integration program at its Prince George's Welcome Center which serves Langley Park and the broader region. More specifically, the funds will provide essential programmatic support, support the salaries of program staff providing services and pay for supplies, instructors and occupancy. The Workforce Development and Immigrant Integration Program includes the following components: Job Placement; Vocational Training; Workplace Safety and Health Training; Job Readiness Counseling; English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL); Financial Education and Assistance; and Legal and Social Services.
Catholic Charities of the Archdiocese of Washington - Re-Entry	\$20,000	Catholic Charities of the Archdiocese of Washington will use grant funds for expenses related to supporting its Welcome Home Reentry Program to provide comprehensive, high-quality case management and mentoring services to returning citizens in Prince George's County.
Central Kenilworth Avenue Revitalization Community Development Corporation	\$40,000	Central Kenilworth Avenue Revitalization Community Development Corporation will use grant funds for expenses related to construction of a Sarvis Café, new vendor purchasing, and training costs for immigrants, refugees and the re-entry population.
Champ House Recovery, Incorporated	\$15,000	Champ House Recovery will use grant funds for expenses related to renovating two bathrooms in the residential areas and possibly two restrooms in the meeting hall.
Children and Parent Resource Group, Inc.	\$50,000	The Children and Parent Resource Group will use grant funds for expenses related to providing 12 middle/high schools a multi sensory, educational, and safe teen driving program (Cinema Drive), a bullying prevention program (Free2B), and an environment awareness program (Planet Home).
Chillum Youth Project, Inc.	\$10,000	Chillum Youth Project will use grant funds for expenses related to conducting its educational programs for at-risk children in the Langley Park - Chillum community.
Christmas in April Prince George's County, Inc.	\$20,000	Christmas in April Prince George's County will use grant funds for expenses related to purchasing materials and supplies to make the home repairs needed for elderly and / or disabled Prince George's County homeowners selected for the program.
City of District Heights- Family & Youth Services Bureau- SMHART	\$50,000	City of District Heights - Family and Youth Services Bureau will use grant funds for expenses related to paying the partial salary of one full-time therapist; providing a minimum of four college tours and four college, career and life after high school workshops; and the development of three extremely important programs: establishing DUI Education courses for young adults needing education assistance, conducting a three-week day camp for children with mental / behavioral health concerns and becoming a licensed substance abuse treatment and recovery bureau for children and teens.
Coalition for Public Safety Training in Schools, Inc.	\$30,000	Coalition for Public Safety Training in Schools will use grant funds for expenses related to helping Prince George's County high school students acquire awareness of the structure and future trends within high skill, high wage public safety professions to increase their career options.

Coalition for Stronger Communities	\$25,000	Coalition for Stronger Communities will use grant funds for expenses related to conducting its financial literacy program for high school students in six high schools in Prince George's County.
Community Advocates for Family & Youth, Inc. (CAFY)	\$10,000	CAFY will use grant funds for expenses related to helping support personnel carry out the critical work for residents (without charge to them) who are impacted, harmed and affected by Crime. Supported and engaged victims help continue crime reduction because they embrace a sense of accountability to their neighborhoods. The victim's participation in the justice system helps bring additional offenders to justice. Funding will also help CAFY strengthen its counseling component with a therapy technique designed to elicit non-verbal responses from victims where words are too painful to verbalize. The therapy works with all age groups, with children, adolescents and older adults.
Community Builders, Ltd.	\$10,000	Community Builders will use grant funds for expenses related to conducting its afterschool program at Glassmanor Elementary School, as well as for offsetting its summer program expenses for high-risk students in the Glassmanor, Hillcrest / Marlow Heights, Oxon Hill and Temple Hills communities in Prince George's County.
Community Crisis Services, Inc.	\$110,000	Community Crisis Services, Inc. (CCSI) will use grant funds for expenses related to supporting staffing of the hotlines and the emergency shelter. The intention is for hotline answer rates over 90%, with the higher goal of 95% as CCSI moves forward. CCSI will add staff who are bilingual at both the shelter and the hotlines to better reach Latino / Hispanic residents in Prince George's County.
Community Legal Services of Prince George's County, Inc.	\$50,000	Community Legal Services of Prince George's County (CLS) will use grant funds for expenses related to implementing its Mobile Legal Services pilot project.
Community Ministry of Prince George's County, Maryland	\$50,000	Community Ministry of Prince George's County will use grant funds for expenses related to providing human services support to include free fresh produce (936,000 pounds), free hot lunches (24,336 meals), bags of groceries (2,400) and referral / educational services to Prince George's County residents who are homeless, near homeless, low income and / or medically underserved.
Community Youth Advance, Inc.	\$30,000	Community Youth Advance, Incorporated (formerly Mentoring to Manhood, Incorporated) will use grant funds for expenses related to supporting its year-round programs that provide young people with tools and training that promote academic success, positive youth development and future self-sufficiency.
Court Appointed Special Advocate (CASA) Prince George's County, Inc.	\$100,000	Court Appointed Special Advocate (CASA) / Prince George's County will use grant funds for expenses related to advocating "...for the physical health, mental health, safe housing, educational and social needs of 180 foster children and youth in foster care...." in Prince George's County.
Educational Video In Spanish, Inc. (EVS Communications)	\$20,000	Educational Video in Spanish, Inc. (EVS Communications) will use grant funds for expenses related to producing three half-hour <i>Linea Directa</i> television programs focusing on issues of importance to Latino families. The programs will be broadcast and cablecast in Prince George's County by Telemundo Washington. By the end of the show, Latino families will not only obtain information on specific services being highlights, but will know how to access and utilize these services.
End Time Harvest Ministries (ETHM) Pathways to Career Success Program	\$75,000	End Time Harvest Ministries (ETHM) Pathways to Career Success Program will use grant funds to work with youth to produce productive citizens with the ability to earn a living wage in their chosen careers. More specifically, funds will be used to pay staff, contractors, use of facilities, transportation, supplies, printing and summer employment intern stipends.

End Time Harvest Ministries (ETHM) Wellness Ambassadors Leadership Program	\$50,000	End Time Harvest Ministries- Wellness Ambassadors Leadership Program will use grant funds to provide experiential nutrition, food access and fitness learning through ETHM FIT 4 success, FIT 2 Be Well, Health Policy Student Council creating wellness policies at Bladensburg High School and other Port Towns schools and venues.
Engaged Community offshoots, Inc., dba ECO City Farms	\$25,000	Engaged Community Offshoots, Inc., dba ECO City Farms will use grant funds for expenses related to providing staff salaries and general support for ECO City Farms' full range of food justice work and youth education programs, but most especially will be used to consolidate, strengthen and grow our food production business, train the next generation of urban farmers and support our efforts to proliferate urban farming in the metro DC area.
Family Restoration and Healing Center	\$20,000	Family Restoration and Healing Center will use grant funds for expenses related to providing education and supportive services that support job readiness, mental health and positive youth development for 130 participants, and job placement, certification or college entry for 70 participants. More specifically, funds will be used for training and for tracking success.
First Generation College Bound, Inc.	\$150,000	First Generation College Bound will use grant funds for general operating support such as salaries and related expenses, accounting services, professional fees, insurance, meetings and conferences, office rent, office supplies, printing, postage and telecommunications.
Food & Friends, Inc.	\$80,000	Food & Friends will use grant funds for expenses related to conducting the following programs: Home-Delivered Meals Program which provides home-delivered specialized meals; the Groceries-to-Go program which offers frozen, canned / packaged and / or fresh groceries to healthier individuals / those who have help available to prepare meals; and the Nutrition, Education & Support Program which provides individualized counseling, cooking classes and other educational programs for eligible Prince George's County clients, caregivers and dependents.
Forest Heights- Oxon Hill Community Development Corporation	\$10,000	Forest Heights - Oxon Hill Community Development Corporation will use grant funds for expenses related to supporting the programs and events it has supported since 2011. These include the Forest Heights Community Day, the Senior Wellness Exercise Program, the Forest Heights Community Garden, the Nickelodeon Worldwide Day of Play, the After-School Tutoring Program, the Abundant Life Ministries Yard Sale, the annual Halloween Harvest, the Dancing Warriorettes, the Senior Holiday Gala and the Glassmanor Veterans Day Celebration.
Friendship Charities Foundation, Inc.	\$50,000	Friendship Charities Foundation will use grant funds for expenses related to supporting programs for senior citizens and disadvantaged youth. Programs for senior citizens include seminars and other events on topics such as identifying and preventing financial scams, information on wills and trusts, health issues, resource fairs and consumer counseling. Programs for youth include youth mentoring, field trips, college preparation and college scholarships.
GapBuster, Inc.	\$10,000	GapBuster will use grant funds for expenses related to exposing Prince George's County students to the Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) program, providing English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL) and Graduate Equivalency Diploma (GED) classes, for general operating expenses and for paying staff.
Global Vision Foundation	\$65,000	Global Vision Foundation, Inc., dba Global Vision Community Health Center, will use grant funds for expenses related to providing medical care to under-served residents of Prince George's County. More specifically, funds will be used to pay rent, utilities and part of the budgeted salary and medical supplies at its primary care center.

Greenbelt Community Foundation	\$25,000	Greenbelt Community Foundation will use grant funds for expenses related to increasing the value of contributions to help the people of Greenbelt receive quality programming and vital services. More specifically, funds will be use to provide grants which support education, the arts, the environment, organizational development, community engagement and historic preservation.
Habitat for Humanity Metro Maryland, Inc.	\$50,000	Habitat for Humanity Metro Maryland will use grant funds for expenses related to providing low-income homeowners in Prince George's County with health and safety home repair services. Some founding will also be used to rehabilitate a vacant, distressed property to be resold to a qualified buyer.
Hands of Hope Foundation, Inc.	\$20,000	Hands of Hope Foundation will use grant funds for expenses related to supporting the Annual Caregivers Conference to be held November 10, 2018.
Hope Connections for Cancer Support, Inc.	\$20,000	Hope Connections for Cancer Support will use grant funds for expenses related to providing special weekly programming to support a group for young African American women with breast cancer in Prince George's County.
Hyattsville Community Development Corporation	\$10,000	Hyattsville Community Development Corporation will use grant funds for programmatic and operating expenses related to its Mapping Racism Project. The end goal of the project is to "produce a pathway for individual property owners in the State of Maryland to affirmatively and permanently remove [restrictive deed covenants] ... from their property deeds."
In Reach, Inc.	\$30,000	In Reach will use grant funds for expenses related to strengthening its operations, implementing programmatic activities and supporting partnership activities in Prince George's County. In Reach's programs are designed to prepare students in Grades K-12 to successfully reach Maryland's College and Career Readiness Standards.
Institute for Public Health Innovation	\$40,000	Institute for Public Health Innovation - fiduciary agent for PGC Food Equity Council (FEC) will use grant funds for expenses related to helping residents grown, sell and choose healthy foods, as well as advance food justice and food-oriented development across the county. More specifically, funds will pay for the program manager and FEC coordinator, for food and materials used for FEC meetings and events, for website design and updates and for local travel and indirect costs.
Ivy Community Charities	\$10,000	The Ivy Community Charities of Prince George's County will use grant funs for expenses related to supporting the Ivy League Program for youth and parents, arts enrichment, scholarships and wrap-around services, including providing new shoes for families in need.
Junior Achievement of Greater Washington	\$80,000	Junior Achievement (JA) will use grant funds for expenses related to underwriting a share of the program costs associated with providing the JA Finance Park Program free-of-charge to Prince George's County students.
Kappa Epsilon Lambda Education Fund, Inc.	\$10,000	Kappa Epsilon Lambda Education Foundation (KELEF) will use grant funds for expenses related to expanding its outreach programs: Project Alpha, College Fair, Mentorship and the Leadership Development Institute. The programs foster mentoring, self-development, career awareness and scholarships.
Kappa Foundation of Fort Washington	\$15,000	Kappa Foundation of Fort Washington will use grant funds for expenses related to providing food, mentoring and scholarships for eligible residents in southern Prince George's County.
La Clinica del Pueblo, Inc.	\$20,000	La Clinica del Pueblo will use grant funds for expenses related to supporting the delivery of high quality, culturally and linguistically appropriate health services for low-income Latino residents in Prince George's County.

Latin American Youth Center	\$80,000	Latin American Youth Center (LAYC) will use grant funds for its Maryland Multicultural Youth Centers to conduct programs to help at-risk and disconnected youth and young adults, especially those who are not enrolled in school, to transition to successful adulthood.
Laurel Advocacy and Referral Services, Inc. (LARS)	\$75,000	Laurel Advocacy and Referral Services will use grant funds for expenses related to covering the salaries of case managers who provide homeless outreach, community referral services and short-term case management to families and individuals facing a financial crisis. Grant funds will also be used to assist Prince George's County residents facing eviction and / or utility cut-off.
Leadership Prince George's	\$20,000	Leadership Prince George's will use grant funds for expenses related to conducting its Emerging Leaders Program and its Healthy Lifestyles Initiative.
Liberty's Promise	\$100,000	Liberty's Promise will use grant funds for expenses related to conducting its after-school program of civic engagement, held at four Prince George's County high schools, twice annually (October - December and March - May) in two 10-week sessions.
Maryland International Corridor Community Development Corporation	\$20,000	Maryland International Corridor Community Development Corporation, dba Northern Gateway CDC, will use grant funds for expenses related to ongoing CDC functions and programs to mitigate the Purple Line's impact on small businesses and residents, beautify the landscape and improve economic opportunity and quality of life.
Mary's Center for Maternal and Child Care	\$20,000	Mary's Center for Maternal and Child Care will use grant funds for expenses related to supporting wellness visits for uninsured and under-insured participants in Prince George's County.
Minority Access, Inc.	\$20,000	Minority Access will use grant funds for expenses related to providing mentoring; Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) workshops; and seminars for middle and high school students.
NAMI Prince George's County, MD, Inc.	\$15,000	NAMI Prince George's County, MD will use grant funds for expenses related to providing general operating support for its programs and services in the following four main categories: Peer Support, Education, Community Outreach, and a Helpline.
Olde Mill Foundation, Inc.	\$10,000	Olde Mill Foundation will use grant funds for expenses related to conducting diversion and mentoring services, enrichment programs and case management for youth referred for truancy and/or juvenile complaints for first-time misdemeanors, for conflict resolution services and for art therapy for Prince George's County middle and high school students. More specifically, funds would provide the salary of one part-time program administrator and the art supplies for the art therapy program.

Prince George's Child Resource Center, Inc.	\$40,000	Prince George's Child Resource Center will use grant funds for expenses related to home visiting early intervention for families at risk to neglect or abuse their children, for comprehensive family support, and for child care provider training.
Prince George's Community College Foundation	\$40,000	Prince George's Community College Foundation will use grant funds for expenses related to increase enrollment in its Culinary Arts and Hospitality programs through enhanced outreach and recruitment strategies. Additionally, funds may also be used for scholarships.

Prince George's County Drug Policy Coalition, Inc.	\$25,000	Prince George's County Drug Policy Coalition will use grant funds for expenses related to providing community-based support to families with a focus on students obtaining higher education through its scholarship program and promoting living a healthy and drug-free lifestyle.
Prince George's Tennis & Education Foundation, Inc.	\$20,000	Prince George's Tennis & Education Foundation will use grant funds for expenses related to providing introductory through advanced training to county youth during and after school hours in an effort to increase physical activity and opportunities for college scholarships. More specifically, funds will be used to help provide the staff, equipment and supplies need to conduct the organization's programs.
Reach Prince George's (no website)	\$10,000	REACH Prince George's, dba Reach PG will use grant funds for expenses related to augmenting at-risk students' ability to compete by increasing technology skills and to assisting senior citizens in their striving for independence by supporting activities that enhance mobility and greater health.

Southern Friendship Community Development Corporation (no website)	\$15,000	Southern Friendship Community Development Corporation will use grant funds for expenses related to advancing human welfare by way of stimulating social and economic changes, with a \$15,000 emphasis on the disadvantaged lower income citizens of our community in areas of nutrition, clothing, arts and general quality of life. More specifically, funds will be used to help finance much-needed operating equipment for its Mobile Food Market and Clothing Giveaway Project.
St. Ann's Center for Children, Youth and Families	\$10,000	St. Ann's Center for Children, Youth and Families will use grant funds for expenses related to salary support for staff of St. Ann's Transitional Housing Program.

More specifically, this means purchasing a new phone system, upgraded iPads and software, information technology planning; planning for the purchase and use of a Customer Response Management (CRM) system; supporting a part-time Administrative System Coordinator and expanding the Coordinator's position to full-time.
Take Charge Juvenile Diversion Program, Inc.	\$50,000	Take Charge Juvenile Diversion Program will use grant funds for expenses related to conducting its program to enhance the safety of the communities served and to provide behavior services to Prince George's County Public School communities that have been affected by poor student performance, disciplinary referrals, truancy and suspensions. The program targets students ages 12 to 16.
The Fort Washington (MD) Alumni Chapter of Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Inc.	\$15,000	The Fort Washington MD Alumni Chapter of Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity will use grant funds for expenses related to providing services to strengthen the economic and health conditions of youth and families of Prince George's County.

(FAME)	\$150,000	The Foundation for the Advancement of Music and Education (FAME) will use grant funds for expenses related to supporting year-round youth programs and workshops, as well as providing staff training. The programs include the FAME Jazz Band Program, the FAME Summer Programs, in-school programs and community events. The staff training would be for a full-time administrative assistant.
The Training Source	\$50,000	The Training Source will use grant funds for expenses related to supporting workforce development, youth leadership and job readiness training programs, and community-bases social services for residents of Prince George's County.
University of Maryland - Educational Opportunity Center	\$40,000	University of Maryland College Park - Educational Opportunity Center will use grant funds for expenses related to continuing its program services, including postsecondary guidance and assistance to residents 19 years and over and selected high school seniors in the councilmanic districts in Prince George's County.
White Rose Foundation, Inc.	\$20,000	White Rose Foundation will use grant funds for expenses related to implementing the "Telepharmacy Demonstration Project for Seniors" at the Belnor senior facility with 30 training sessions to include large group as well as individually prescribed follow-up sessions for any senior who additional tutorial, supplies and evaluation.
