Organization Name	Amount	Grant Purpose
Anacostia Watershed Society, Inc.	\$3,000	Anacostia Watershed Society will use grant funds to support programs that educate and engage students and teachers from District 3 in a three-part environmental education programs, which are aligned with Maryland educational standards.
Berwyn Heights Elementary School	\$1,000	Berwyn Heights Elementary School will use grant funds to supplement transportation costs for their school-wide field trip program. Students will visit the historic Bladensburg Waterfront Park and selected museums and/or cultural venues for experiential learning days.
Brighter Bites	\$3,000	Brighter Bites will use grant funds to implement their three-pronged program at five elementary schools and four summer camps in Prince George's County over the school year 2019-2020.
B-Roll Media and Arts, Inc.	\$1,000	B-Roll Media and Arts will use grant funds to support free media arts training and education to under-resourced youth ages 13-21 and youth with diagnosed learning disabilities in the County.
Carrollton Elementary School	\$1,000	Carrollton Elementary School will use grant funds to support their "Outdoor Classroom" and green initiatives.
Christian Life Center	\$5,000	Christian Life Center will use grants to support their current hunger-fighting work during the COVID-19 pandemic, particularly the costs of their increased food distribution and more health and safety equipment.
City of College Park	\$4,000	City of College Park will use grant funds to provide food/supplies in support of the City of College Park's Hispanic Parent Support Group, which meets a minimum of 46 times per year and is attended, on average, by 31 parents and 48 children.
College Park Arts Exchange, Inc.	\$4,000	College Park Arts Exchange will use grant funds for expenses related to programming for Children and Youth groups and music performance groups (Choir, Orchestra, Band, Youth Musical), Arts Drop In (multiple locations), and AHA Kids monthly events. Grant funds will also be used for artist fees, supplies, and space rentals.
Community Legal Services of Prince George's County, Inc.	\$3,044	Community Legal Services of Prince George's County will use grant funds for general operating expenses. The funds will provide additional support to current programs and provide additional assistance to residents of Prince George's County.
Community Youth Advance, Inc.	\$2,500	Community Youth Advance will use grant funds to deliver academic enrichment, mentoring, and college and career readiness activities that promote academic excellence, promote character and prepare youth to meet life's challenges.
Congregations United for Compassion and Empowerment, Inc.	\$2,500	Congregations United for Compassion and Empowerment will use grant funds for the coordinator's salary, client supplies, food, thermal underwear, coats, sleeping bags, and medical costs not covered by health insurance such as co-pays, prescriptions, and eye glasses.
Court Appointed Special Advocate (CASA)/ Prince George's County, Inc.	\$3,000	Court Appointed Special Advocate will use grant funds to advocate for the physical health, mental health, safe housing, educational and social needs of 200 foster children and youth in foster care. Youth who age out of foster care to adulthood at 21, at least 75% will be stably housed and at least 70% will be employed or enrolled in an educational program leading to employment. General operation funds will contribute towards the cost of training new volunteers.
Crossword, Inc. dba The Pathways School	\$1,000	Crossword/ The Pathways School will use grant funds to provide materials for the creation of a mural at Du Val High School and to partially pay the fee of the teaching artist who will lead the mural project. The mural will be the culminating artwork of an arts residency with high school special education students.
Embry Center for Family Life	\$2,000	Embry Center for Family Life will use grant funds to support their B.O.O.S.T. Tutoring Program for K-12 students in the College Park Area.
Family Restoration & Healing Center, Inc.	\$2,000	Family Restoration & Healing Center will use grant funds to support their 360 Wholeness program's educational training, workforce development, and counseling services.
First Generation College Bound, Inc.	\$4,000	First Generation College Bound will us grant funds for general operating support during FY20 to help support FGCB's three programs: Homework Club, College Success, and Great Minds Great Futures.

Food & Friends, Inc.	\$2,000	Food and Friends will use grant funds to provide medically tailored, home-delivered meals and groceries to individuals with serious illnesses such as HIV/AIDS and cancer that are too ill to buy and prepare food for themselves.
Hope Connections for Cancer Support, Inc.	\$1,500	Hope Connections for Cancer Support will use grant funds for expenses related to providing interactive nutrition education programs and a Wellness Day to help reduce stress and educate participants on the importance of nutrition during cancer.
Housing Initiative Partnership, Inc	\$3,000	Housing Initiative Partnership will use grant funds to provide their bilingual housing counseling services, one-on-one, to tenants at East Pines Terrace Apts over the next 12 months, to position them for future rental or homeownership opportunities, ahead of their displacement.
La Clinica del Pueblo, Inc.	\$3,000	La Clinica del Pueblo will use grant funds to support their programs that intend to meet healthcare needs of Latino families in Prince George's County through the provision of comprehensive primary care and mental health services that are culturally and linguistically appropriate for residents who are low-income and uninsured.
Liberty's Promise, Inc.	\$4,000	Liberty's Promise will use grant funds to support after-school programs of civic engagement, held at Parkdale High School, twice annually in 10-week sessions.
Magnolia Elementary School	\$1,456	Magnolia Elementary School will use grant funds to renew their DreamBox Seat License subscription.
Maryland 49ers, Inc. (no website)	\$1,000	Maryland 49ers will use grant funds to assist the organization in improving the quality of life, health, and group interaction skills of at-risk youth through sports and cheerleading activities. More specifically, grant funds will be used for transportation expenses, supplies, league registration fees and uniforms.
Mary's Center for Maternal and Child Care, Inc.	\$2,000	Mary's Center for Maternal and Child Care will use grant funds for expenses related to wellness visits for uninsured and under-insured patients in Prince George's County.
Meals on Wheels of the College Park Area, Inc.	\$3,000	Meals on Wheels of the College Park Area will use grant funds to purchase food items to assist with meal preparation for clients. Grant funds will be utilized to prevent the need to increase the price of the daily client contribution for service.
Mentoring Through Athletics, Inc.	\$1,000	Mentoring Through Athletics will use the grant funds to provide homework assistance and facilitate a character development program for the student participants in the mentoring program.
NAMI Prince George's County MD, Inc.	\$2,500	NAMI Prince George's County will use grant funds to support the planning, implementation, and management of current and new programming that provide mental health education, support, advocacy and community outreach programs for county residents.
Neighborhood Design Center, Inc.	\$1,000	The Neighborhood Design Center will use grant funds to support the organization's work with communities in Prince George's County that are below or just above the 51% AMI (area median income). Grant funds will support the organization's staff in direct service to communities and projects.
Paint Branch Elementary School, Prince George's County Public School	\$1,000	Paint Branch Elementary School will use grant funds to support STEM projects and technology use in their school.
Parkdale High School, Parkdale Robotics	\$2,000	Parkdale Robotics will use grant funds for registrations fees to compete in FIRST Technical Challenge (FTC) and FIRST Robotics Competition (FRC).
Prince George's Arts & Humanities Council, Inc.	\$1,500	Prince George's Arts & Humanities Council will use grant funds for their Prince George's County Arts Community Emergency Relief Fund.
Prince George's Child Resource Center, Inc.	\$3,000	Prince George's Child Resource Center will use grant funds for expenses related to providing comprehensive, two-generation family support services; home visiting early intervention for families at risk to neglect or abuse their children; and technical assistance and professional development for early child care providers. More specifically, funds will be used for unfunded programmatic costs of program supplies and client services.
Prince George's County Police Athletic League	\$2,500	Prince George's County Police Athletic League will use grants funds to provide the equipment and supplies for their programs, and to cover operational costs and insurance costs.
Prince George's County Police T.E.P., Inc. (no website)	\$1,000	Prince George's County Police T.E.P. will use grant funds to fund the Prince George's County Police Explorer Program. Funds will be used for expenses such as uniforms, travel, explorer and advisor training, and community service opportunities.
Prince George's Philharmonic	\$1,000	Prince George's Philharmonic will use grant funds to support their educational outreach programs and increased production cost of Philharmonic concerts during the 2019-2020 season.

Seabrook Elementary School	\$1,000	Seabrook Elementary School will use grant funds for expenses related to their attendance incentive program that will reward students with perfect attendance with pizza parties, ice cream parties and certificates and prizes.
SEAC, Inc.	\$1,250	SEAC will use grant funds to support stipends to college students working in SEAC's Math Achievers Program (MAP), a 6-week summer math instruction and enrichment program for Prince George's County middle school students and their parents.
Solutions in Hometown Connections Corp.	\$2,750	Solutions in Hometown Corporation will use grant funds for the salary of the Early Childhood Specialist, a critical position within the English Language Learning Program.
Sowing Empowerment and Economic Development, Inc.	\$5,000	The grant fund will be used for Food Distribution Center, Clothes Closet, Diaper Distribution, Nutrition Education, and Financial Literacy Training.
St. Ann's Center for Children, Youth and Families	\$1,000	St. Ann's Center for Children, Youth and Families will use grant funds to support the salaries of the direct care staff that provide daily supervision and guidance to residents of the Transitional Housing Program for homeless woman with children.
Take Charge Juvenile Diversion Program, Inc.	\$3,500	Take Charge Juvenile Diversion Program will use grant funds for expenses related to facilitating a Leadership Development and Life Skills Mastery Program at Charles Carroll MS. More specifically, funds will be used for staffing, materials, equipment, training, data management and refreshments for the program for the FY20 academic year.
The Maryland Umbrella Group	\$1,000	The Maryland Umbrella Group will use grant funds to support their Villages and Aging in Place programs. Funds will be used to expand reach and support to residents in these programs and other operational costs such as background checks and educational resources.
The One World Center for Autism, Inc.	\$1,000	The One World Center for Autism will use grant funds for operational costs related to the healthcare, individual and family support services they provide to Prince George's County residents living with autism.
The Training Source, Inc.	\$1,000	The Training Source will use grant funds for general operating support of adult job training; youth leadership, college and planning; job readiness training; wrap-around support services (SNAP, clothing, etc.); and small business staffing assistance and staff training.
Town of University Park	\$1,000	Town of University Park will use grant funds to establish a temporary assistance fund to assist financial challenged seniors that live in the town.
World Arts Focus, Inc., dba Joe's Movement Emporium	\$2,000	World Arts Focus will use grant funds to support the Ability Project, an intensive month-long dance project for Parkdale High School CRI special education students that includes a performance for fellow students and parents.
