The University of Maryland College Park Foundation, Inc. - Incentive Award Program (IAP)	\$150,000	The University of Maryland College Park Foundation, Inc. - Incentive Award Program (IAP) will use grant funds to provide scholarships to students from Prince George's County public schools to attend the University of Maryland through the Incentive Award Program.
The Foundation for the Advancement of Music and Education, Inc. [FAME]	\$150,000	The Foundation for the Advancement of Music and Education, Inc. [FAME] will use grant funds for general operating expenses. More specifically, FAME will use grant funds for staff salary; academic and music instruction; travel and transportation for musicians; equipment, software and instruments; and scholarships related to FAME's ongoing programs.
Greater Prince George's Business Roundtable, Inc.	\$140,000	Greater Prince George's Business Roundtable will use grant funds for continuing the partnership between businesses, the county and Joint Base Andrews (\$60,000). The remaining \$80,000 will go to Prince George's Suite Magazine so it can continue to provide lifestyle content to the county.
Community Crisis Services, Inc.	\$100,000	Community Crisis Services will use grant funds for staffing costs to ensure that Call Center Crisis Hotlines are answered over 90% of the time within 90 seconds and to ensure it never turns away individuals / families who are homeless.
Court Appointed Special Advocate (CASA) / Prince George's County, Inc.	\$100,000	Court Appointed Special Advocate (CASA) / Prince George's County will use grant funds to advocate for the physical health, mental health, safe housing, educational and social needs of 200 foster youth. Of youth who age out at 21, at least 75% will be stably housed and at least 70% employed or enrolled in an educational program leading to employment.
Liberty's Promise, Inc.	\$100,000	Liberty's Promise, Inc. will use grant funds to support an after-school program of civic engagement, held at Parkdale High School, twice annually, either in-person or virtually, in 10-week sessions, running from March to May and again from October to December.
End Time Harvest Ministries, Inc.	\$100,000	End Time Harvest Ministries will use grant funds to continue their ETHM's Pathway to Career Success program, which develops youth academically with a career and college preparation focus, including on-time graduation and preparation for college and workforce entry.
Latin American Youth Center, inc.	\$100,000	Latin American Youth Center/Maryland Multicultural Youth Center's (LAYC/MMYC) Prince George's County will use grant funds to support middle school and high school youths' successful transition to adulthood via academic, workforce, and wraparound supports.

Hillside Children's Center	\$100,000	Hillside Children's Center will use grant funds to support program activities including enrichment opportunities for youth, program supplies, purchase of program services, related conference/membership fees and staff mileage, all with a direct impact on their programs and the PGCPSS students they serve.
Institute for Public Health/Prince George's County Food Equity Council	\$100,000	Institute for Public Health/Prince George's County Food Equity Council will use grant funds to design and implement programs and system changes that increase County food distribution and storage capacity increase County procurement from local growers and minority-owned businesses, and address the root causes of food insecurity in the County.
Junior Achievement of Greater Washington	\$100,000	Junior Achievement of Greater Washington will use grant funds to provide comprehensive financial literacy education to every seventh-grade student in PGCPSS, as well as to lay the groundwork and support the expansion of 3DE—a STEM-certified, holistic instructional model.
Bowie State University Foundation	\$100,000	Bowie State University Foundation will use grant funds to assist students continue their education and provide them with financial support through a scholarship that will assist in enrollment and retention.
Bowie Business Innovation Center, Inc. (Bowie BIC)	\$100,000	Bowie Business Innovation Center, Inc. (Bowie BIC) will use grant funds to cover the cost of the salary and health insurance for the Bowie BIC Director of Operations and a portion of the management fee for the Executive Director.

Community Youth Advance, Inc.	\$50,000	Community Youth Advance will use grant funds to deliver year-round quality academic enrichment, monitoring, and college and career readiness activities that promotes academic excellence, promote character and prepare youth to meet life's challenges.
Bold Beautiful Brilliant Girls Youth Empowerment Group	\$50,000	Bold Beautiful Brilliant Girls Youth Empowerment Group will use grants funds for their young mentees who are our future to see how they too can impact others by acknowledging those who have and are currently doing that work and what it means to the community.
World Arts Focus, dba Joe's Movement Emporium	\$50,000	World Arts Focus, dba Joe's Movement Emporium, will use grant funds to support Joe's CreativeWorks Program, a seven-month vocational training program for high school seniors and recently out-of-school youth, providing technical, artistic skills-based training and curriculum in life skills, job training and college preparation.
Operation Earnie's Plate, Incorporated	\$50,000	Operation Earnie's Plate will use grant funds to support the general operating costs of its food pantry in Councilmanic District 9. The Clinton Manor Pantry, located at 8500 Mike Shapiro Drive in Clinton, will support approximately 1,000 residents with food for the Thanksgiving season.
United Communities Against Poverty, Inc. [UCAP]	\$50,000	United Communities Against Poverty, Inc. will use grant funds for general operating support which will continue to provide supportive safety-net services such as food, housing and emergency services to the citizens (children, youth, adults and seniors) of Prince George's County.
Christmas in April * Prince George's County, Inc.	\$50,000	Christmas in April * Prince George's County will use grant funds to purchase materials / supplies and services for its upcoming 2022 event when it repairs the homes of selected homeowners.
Food & Friends, Inc.	\$50,000	Food & Friends will use grant funds to provide home-delivered, medically-tailored meals and groceries to people living with serious illnesses like HIV, cancer, diabetes, COPD, end-stage renal disease, etc., whose illness prevents them from shopping for and preparing food for themselves.
ARC of Prince George's County, Inc.	\$50,000	ARC of Prince George's County, Inc., will use grant funds to support The Arc's programming that assists youth with I/DD successfully transition from school to adulthood, and their Benefits Enrollment Center, which connects individuals to public benefits to which they are entitled.
Coalition for African Americans in the Performing Arts, Inc.	\$50,000	The Coalition for African Americans in the Performing Arts, Inc. will use grant funds to continue serving Black Classical musicians, youth, senior citizens and families in creative, inclusive, and artistically beneficial programming.
Friendship Charities Foundation, Inc.	\$50,000	Friendship Charities Foundation, Inc. will use grant funds to support programs for senior citizens focusing on health, nutrition and wellness and to provide tutoring, mentor-ship and scholarships to disadvantaged youth in Prince George's County, Maryland.

More specifically, funds will be used to offset salary and benefit expenses of three staff members involved in the delivery service.
Community Builders, Ltd.	\$50,000	Community Builders, Ltd. will use grant funds to provide summer academic enrichment and after school programming for elementary and middle school aged youth. Their programs will foster academic improvement, personal development, healthy lifestyles, and family functions and will be targeted to at-risk youth.
The Latino Student Fund	\$50,000	The Latino Student Fund will use grant funds to support its tutoring program to address learning losses and mitigate pre-existing learning gaps.
Central Kenilworth Avenue Revitalization CDC	\$50,000	Central Kenilworth Avenue Revitalization Community Development Corporation (CKAR) will use grant funds for expenses such as salaries of program staff, supplies, instructors and occupancy to support its holistic workforce development (including culinary arts) program at the Greater Riverdale Empowerment Center/Sarvis Cafe.
Prince George's Child Resource Center, Inc.	\$50,000	Prince George's Child Resource Center, Inc. will use grant funds for general operating support to sustaining their full suite of programs, which help families and child care providers navigate educational, economic and health challenges, especially in the area of COVID-19.
Prince George's County Community Development Corp.	\$50,000	Prince George's County Community Development Corp. will use grant funds to community empowerment inclusive of but not limited to financial literacy programs; food drives; community economic development advocacy; educational radio programs and community development internships for college students.
Community Services Foundation	\$50,000	Community Services Foundation will use grant funds to support direct service staff for their Out-of-School Time STEAM Program serving 500 at-risk youth and adult residents of 9 low-income housing complexes located throughout Prince George's County.
Mission of Love Charities, Incorporated.	\$50,000	Mission of Love Charities will use grant funds to support services to low-income and homeless individuals and families in Prince George's County. Services will include job training, as well as the provision of food, clothing, furniture, mental health referrals and a day center.

Maryland Women's Business Center	\$40,000	Maryland Women's Business Center will use grant funds to maintain their full-time Senior Business Counselor dedicated to providing one-on-one counseling as well as workshop trainings in Prince George's County.
University of Maryland System (University of Maryland College Park)	\$40,000	University of Maryland Educational Opportunity Center (UM-EOC) will use grant funds to continue programmatic services, postsecondary (PSE), career coaching, GED referral, PSE placement for adults 19 years & older in Prince George's County.
Damascus House Community Development Corporation	\$35,000	Damascus House Community Development Corporation will use grant funds to expanded their transitional housing program for returning citizens; opened their 1st women's house and 2nd men's house. Also, funds will be used for lease payments and operating expenses for the 2 recently opened houses.
